Planner's comments - David Brook

My only addition to Rob's detailed analysis is to further apologise to Brown course runners regarding the terrain between their controls 13 and 14. The bracken growth in that area over the last few days was extremely rapid and that, together with the wet rock on the day, made the area very difficult to negotiate safely.

Otherwise, my thanks to Rob for his helpful suggestions and thorough controlling and to you all for taking part. Planning at Bewick Moor, with its technical terrain and excellent map, is always a pleasure.

Controllers comments - Rob McKenna

Times for the courses are roughly in line with what we expected. Although green and blue look a little on the long side, there were good reasons behind this. Dave had planned the courses to the guidelines working to an expected winning time for an M21 running on the area as if it were a badge event. This gave an approximate course length of about 12k and all courses were originally a ratio of this distance. At first sight, I thought a Brown course of 9.5k would have been too long, but on trial running of the course, the area proved to be quite fast. Dave's intention was to allow the Green, Blue and Brown courses to sample the more technical area at Blaewearie, which made the Blue and Green slightly longer than normal. The shorter courses were limited by the technicality of the start area and consequently were a bit tougher going under foot than we would have liked, but this was very difficult to avoid.

Given all the restraints of distance and runnability for the shorter courses to the technicality of the longer courses. I think Dave has done very well and most of the comments at the finish seemed favourable.

There was a complaint on the Brown course with respect to control number 236, crag foot. Apparently the kite was difficult to find as it was obscured by an overhanging tree. This was a bit of a controlling error, as I thought that the original control site, which was the shallow re-entrant to the SW of the craq would have been difficult to mark up on a colour coded, 1:15000 map. Hence, the crag was substituted at the last minute as I thought that this was a more obvious feature on

the map. Unfortunately I had only seen it from above and not investigated it from the direction the competitors would have approached it. Apologies for anybody who was inconvenienced by this oversight.

One other problem was the tough going at the finish. Again, this was rather unavoidable due to last minute changes requested by the local tenant farmer. The original finish area was to be in the open quarried area to the east, with a few technical controls and an easier run in. Unfortunately a herd of cattle was moved into that quarry area shortly before the event and it was thought inappropriate to have runners using the fenced off area.

The weather also proved to have a significant effect on the competition. In the three times that I have visited the area, I have had glorious sunny weather, including the evening before checking control sites. I do not believe that competitors have the seen the best of Bewick Moor as yet, hopefully another time.
